The Plays of Euripides in English ... Pomona Press

In *Andromache*, Hektor's widow struggles to survive as the concubine of her husband's killer. *Herakles' Children* and *Herakles* show his two young families, without his powerful protection at the mercy of his enemies. Full of humanity and subtle characterisation, these new translations by Robert Cannon and Kenneth McLeish which are intended both for performer and student, Euripides is reaffirmed as a fresh and compelling dramatist.

Archelaus, Andromeda, Bellerophon, Palamedes & Philoctetes These five lost plays dramatize several of the great myths that Euripides employed to explore his sense of who the gods might be (and might not be). *Andromeda* and *Perseus* escape the Sea Monster only to face her father's decision that she marry someone other than *Perseus*. The exiled *Archelaus* fights a successful battle only to be threatened by the very king he has defended. *Bellerophon*, the greatest horseman in the world, tames the winged *Pegasus*, but flies too high for *Zeus*'s liking. *Palamedes* puts his faith in the Goddess of Luck, but finds that even she cannot promise good luck. *Philoctetes* possesses the bow and arrows of *Heracles*. Will he place these weapons at the service of *Odysseus* and the Greek war against *Troy*? Women, men, and the gods discover their meanings (and non-meanings) in these translations of ancient stories into what the author conceives to be the probing style of Euripides. About the author: The last of *Courson's* Euripidean trilogy, *Lost Plays* features five plays that we know Euripides wrote but that have survived only in a few papyrus fragments. *Courson* has previously published *Fourteen Plays by Euripides* (plus one) (Mathom, 2003) and *Five Plays by Euripides* (Just Write Books, 2010). Two of his adaptations, *The Trojan Women* and *Heracles* have been

performed by the Theater Project, Brunswick, Maine. *Courson's* recent book of poems, *Blues in the Night* was published by Moonpie Press. He teaches Shakespeare at Southern New Hampshire University.

The Bacchæ is the last and greatest of Euripides' plays. 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The Plays of Euripides Volume 1

Euripides (c. 480 - 406 BCE) was one of the three great tragedians of classical Athens, the other two being Aeschylus and Sophocles. Some ancient scholars attributed ninety-five plays to him but according to the Suda it was ninety-two at most. Of these, eighteen or nineteen have survived more or less complete (there has been debate about his authorship of Rhesus, largely on stylistic grounds) and there are also fragments, some substantial, of most of the other plays. More of his plays have survived intact than those of Aeschylus and Sophocles together, partly due to mere chance and partly because his popularity grew as theirs declined—he became, in the Hellenistic Age, a cornerstone of ancient literary education, along with Homer, Demosthenes and Menander.
