Jeffrey Dahmer. Ted Bundy. John Wayne Gacy. Over the past thirty years, serial killers have become iconic figures in America, the subject of made-for-TV movies and mass-market paperbacks alike. But why do we find such luridly transgressive and horrific individuals so fascinating? What compels us to look more closely at these figures when we really want to look away? Natural Born Celebrities considers how serial killers have become lionized in American culture and explores the consequences of their fame. David Schmid provides a historical account of how serial killers became famous and how that fame has been used in popular media and the corridors of the FBI alike. Ranging from H. H. Holmes, whose killing spree during the 1893 Chicago World's Fair inspired *The Devil in the White City*, right up to Aileen Wuornos, the lesbian prostitute whose vicious murder of seven men would serve as the basis for the hit film *Monster*, Schmid unveils a new understanding of serial killers by emphasizing both the social dimensions of their crimes and their susceptibility to multiple interpretations and uses. He also explores why serial killers have become endemic in popular culture, from their depiction in *The Silence of the Lambs* and *The X-Files* to their becoming the stuff of trading cards and even Web sites where you can buy their hair and nail clippings. Bringing his fascinating history right up to the present, Schmid ultimately argues that America needs the perversely familiar figure of the serial killer now more than ever to manage the fear posed by Osama bin Laden since September 11. Beginning employment at the USPS, a dubious phenomenon occurred in the work environment that seemed to be stemming from administrative positions. At thirty-two years old and having a poor track record with past endeavors, I knew if there ever came a point in time where I would have to defend my merit, it would be against the word of people who have decades in the postal service, multiple people saying the same thing. With the inclination that I had entered a corrupt environment and the unwillingness to compromise my integrity, I would have to write down in detail every time something happened that affected me and my career negatively. I documented for a full year, and on my first vacation starting 381 days after my start date with the USPS, I began writing a book, returning from my vacation on May 26. I received a predisciplinary interview. I was thirty thousand words into my novel when this happened. Over the course of fourteen days, I received several disciplinary actions, the last one being a seven-day suspension. The same day, I discovered OIG released a report on June 10 that publicly disclosed the findings of a four-year investigation over stamp count analysis stating the amount of offices that exceeded the maximum order shipments from stamp fulfillment services (12,151 offices in 2018) and how offices were able to hide the additional inventory. It was a feature added in retail system software called "excludable stamp stock inventory." It was a storage unit that the USPS devised to move additional stamps during quarter two of the physical year (Merry Christmas). This feature is what's called a gap in internal controls. It's not monitored, and there is no SOP for administrative action. OIG made this discovery by arresting one postmaster who exceeded the stamp ordering from stamp fulfillment services, transferring excess inventory to excludable stamp stock in RSS, and virtually walking them out of the building, selling them to a third party dealer or on eBay (OIG report number FT-AR-19-0008). When this information was released, I had caught up to myself in time, and it gave me the last chapter of my book, *Bridging the Gap to Solvency Fixing the USPS*. It was the broken lightbulb that lit up the entire strand of lights. Louis Dejoy took over command as the PMG the following week, about whom in my book I stated, "He is a Brooklyn Juggernaut, and postal workers will suffer the fate in which we brought upon ourselves. I take full responsibility and maintain my loyalty to the USPS." I submitted the manuscript two weeks later

to a few different publishing agencies which all wanted to sign a contract with me the same week PMG Dejoy began his march forward. The book is to enlighten the public so the mass workforce cannot rise up and stop necessary actions that must happen so the postal service can fulfill a universal mandate of delivering the mail. It's done. I did it. I didn't get assassinated, and I hope it makes a positive difference for those who choose to do the right thing. That's what it's about.

Cohen can't afford to move out, and bored with the office job, he decides to apply for a career as a police officer. When Cohen learns his application has been accepted, his mother is terribly disappointed. Jewish boys grow up to be doctors and lawyers, not police officers! After successfully graduating from the police academy, Cohen is assigned to Ludwig Borman, his field training officer, who is rumored to be an anti-Semite raised in post-World War II Germany. This is where the trouble begins, as a series of twists and turns and unexpected circumstances lead Cohen to wonder if he is truly destined for law enforcement. Cop Cohen offers a combination of light wit, deep characters, and the true grit of police work, making it a powerful and entertaining debut novel.

Cop House is a short story collection about people desperately trying to recapture--or replace--the things they've lost. There are secret vacations, library book fetishes, women who participate in "fully-clothed, free-form touching and explorative play experiences" in exchange for protection from teenage vandals, and a doomsday cult operating out of an aquatic centre. An exiled polar bear spies on his old community and fights to survive in unfamiliar territory. A man campaigns to keep the sitcom Friends on the air after the collapse of his family. A masochistic deer wants to feel something other than the slow digestion of cud: "The thing I really fantasize about is that one night a driver will stop and reverse slowly over my tail. And then maybe they get out, and slam one of my legs in the car door. Oh god. Maybe they tie me up like they're going to mount me on the roof rack, but instead they just douse me in windshield washerfluid." Infused with dark humour, each of the sixteen stories included in the collection explores the absurdity of life when the things that really matter are placed just out of reach. Cop House is a book about the lengths people will go to undo the things that can't be undone.

Uncle John's Bathroom Reader Tunes into TV University Press of Kansas

In her debut collection, *Congratulations, Rhododendrons*, award-winning poet Mary Germaine offers love poems to an insistently unlovely world. Through poems that speak to plastic bags and drones as much as they admire roses and the moon, Germaine surfs the confluence of artificial and natural environments, technology, and our small but consequential feelings about them. At turns devotional and suspicious, these poems toe the boundaries of intimacy, responsibility, and reason. In anxious times, anything can be taken as a sign; a crow, a talking coin, and a news report are all sources of information whose truth (or "fake-ness") demand investigation. Germaine's poems scroll from a shrine in Lourdes to an augmented-reality sandbox, from a mall filled with loitering ex-love interests to a fairy-tale ending where all the men turn out to be chairs. Funny, provocative, sly, and melancholic, *Congratulations, Rhododendrons* makes a case for the hope that every apparent disaster of social investment might in the end be redeemed as meaningful, genuine, or at least in some way helpful.

First Girl Gone SBD Entertainment

The musical has been called "the most popular form of entertainment in the world." This work examines the subjects, themes, and contemporary relevance of Hollywood musicals through their long popularity, placing each show in historical and political context and analyzing it in detail. A chapter is devoted to how *Goldiggers* of 1933 (1933) and *Stand Up and Cheer* (1934) deal with the economic crises of the Depressions. Another addresses race issues by examining the prevalence of blackface minstrelsy in the 1930s and 1940s, looking at productions like *Swing Time* (1936) and *Dixie* (1943). Rock and roll culture, which started in the 1950s and threatened America with teenage sex and rebellion, is addressed through such hits as *Girl Crazy* (1943), *Bye Bye Birdie* (1963), and *Grease* (1978). The work also explores dance as a signifier of character, the geography of musicals (such as New York or "the South"), fantasy settings, Fred Astaire and Gene Kelly, and the musical biopic (mentioning biographies of such figures as Ziegfeld, Cohan, Rogers and Hart, Cole Porter, and Jerome Kern). A later chapter discusses intertextuality in such shows as *Singin' in the Rain* (1952), which refers to many earlier musicals; *Kiss Me Kate* (1953) which refers to *Taming of the Shrew*; and *All That Jazz* (1970) which refers to the life and work of Bob Fosse. The work concludes with an examination of the continuing popularity of the musical with such hits as *Moulin Rouge* (2001) and *Chicago* (2002). Justice Performed: Courtroom TV Shows and the Theaters of Popular Law is the first study of the reality TV genre to trace its theatrical legacy, connecting the phenomenon of the daytime TV shows to a long history of theatrical trials staged to educate audiences in pedagogies of citizenship. It examines how judge TV fulfills part of law's performative function: that of providing a participatory spectacle the public can recognize as justice. Since it debuted in 1981 with *The People's Court*, which made famous its star jurist, Judge Joseph A. Wapner, dozens of judges have made the move to television. Unlike the demographics in actual courts, most TV judges are non-white men and women hailing from diverse cultural and racial backgrounds. These judges charge their decisions with personal preferences and cultural innuendos, painting a very different picture of what justice looks like. Drawing on interviews with TV judges, producers and production staff, as well as the author's experience as a studio audience member, the book scrutinizes the performativity of the genre, the needs it meets and the inherent ideological biases about race, gender and civic instruction.
